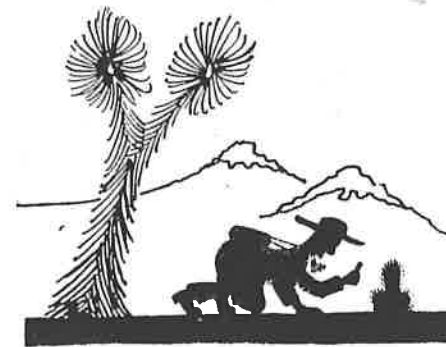

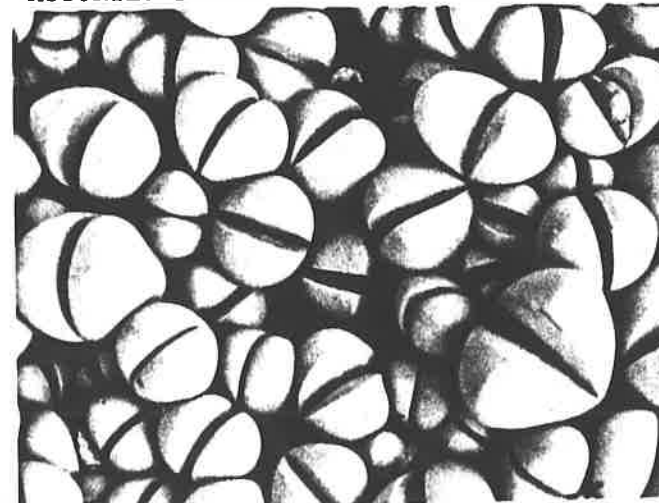

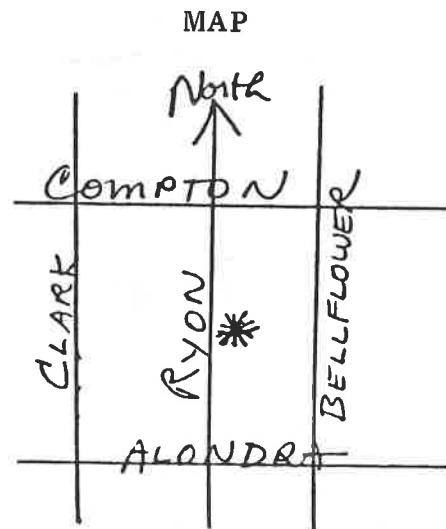
## LBCC FABULOUS OCTOBER AUCTION INFORMATION SHEET.....

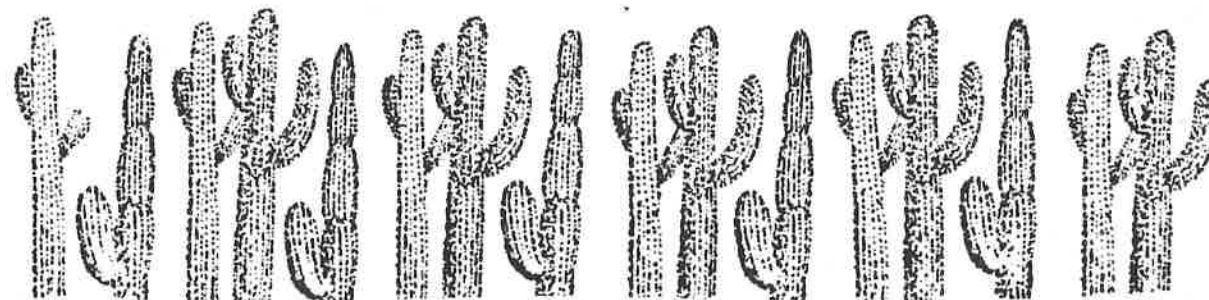

## 1988 HUNTINGTON SYMPOSIUM ON SUCCULENT PLANTS

One of the goals of the Symposium is to bring together professionals and hobbyists in the cactus & succulent world. It is meant to provide an opportunity for enthusiasts of all degrees of knowledge and interest to communicate informally before and after the various talks. The talks themselves are especially useful for those eager to learn. Of course, some speakers are more dynamic than others, and sometimes botanical language can create a slight barrier to communication, but any hobbyist who pays attention will get at least a general idea of the current work being done on our favorite plants by the "experts." Usually the hobbyist will glean a great deal of specific and useful information on cultural and other matters.

This year two themes emerged during the day session. One was the ongoing discussion as to how plants are described, named, & classified -- what aspects of a plant do botanists look at to try to figure out which plants are related & therefore what they should be called? Many hobbyists feel this work is unimportant to them, but in real life we all try to see, describe, understand, define & even classify the world around us. Learning the difficulties, learning to think logically, learning & accepting limitations (we will probably never know everything about plant relationships & how they evolved -- even the most knowledgeable explain that in the end, it's educated opinion), learning how to better see -- all these things have applications far beyond the plant world. So does organizing in a useful way what we observe.

But this year it was the second theme which I most enjoyed. Many of the speakers, & Allan Zimmerman in particular, explained why our plants grow in certain places & not in others. Zimmerman explored the Chihuahuan Desert & illustrated clearly how endemics (species or varieties which tend to grow in just one limited area) are often clustered. (That is, one area may have several endemics). Both Steve Brack & Steve Hammer discussed the same thing in relation to the Mesembs, though their primary subjects were different. Brack concentrated on the culture of various genera, and Hammer showed us some very odd conophytums. In doing so, he also addressed the problems of trying to figure out which plants are related to which, and why.

Plant relationships, habitat, and culture are all interrelated. In learning more about one you will come to know more about the others. At the Huntington Symposium, you also have the chance to meet some of the world's finest growers, botanists, & enthusiasts in the country & world. Which is not to say you will always agree with them, or even admire them. But many combine horticultural & botanical expertise with an enthusiastic appreciation of the sculptural beauty of our plants. So although talents and interests may vary somewhat, the various disciplines of the cactus &

succulent world are woven together into one rich tapestry at a Symposium such as this, and it is difficult not to be enriched. Hopefully, our own knowledge, horticultural abilities and aesthetic appreciation will also combine...the Compleat Cactophile (pardon the expression!).

Appropriately, the final speaker of the day, Paul Hutchison, brought us full circle. Known for his early discoveries and botanical abilities, he has for the past 20 years or so concentrated on the beauty of our plants and on how to make them grow well. It is my understanding that he, in a sense, turned his back on taxonomy. But trips to Brazil in the last 8 years and a review of his slides for the Symposium talk, renewed an interest in introducing and describing new plants -- and saying a few things about old ones. He has unfinished business in the so-called scientific area of our world. And he has new things to say. Which is not to say he will stop growing the plants for their beauty at Tropic World!

The Symposium is one time and place hobbyists and professionals can try to communicate. There may be language difficulties; but we really are one world, with lots to learn and share. If you missed the Symposium, the Denver CSSA Convention will again bring many dedicated hobbyists and professionals together. And at meetings and shows throughout the year, many learning and sharing opportunities will exist. Although there are some growers, hobbyists, & professionals who prefer to work alone, interacting with others allows us to learn and give and maybe make a difference-- to make a contribution on behalf of the plants we love. It is one world.

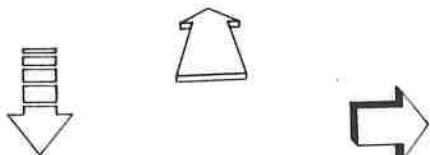

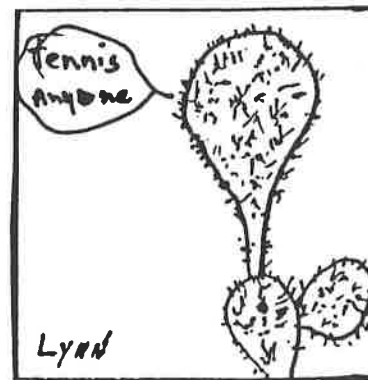

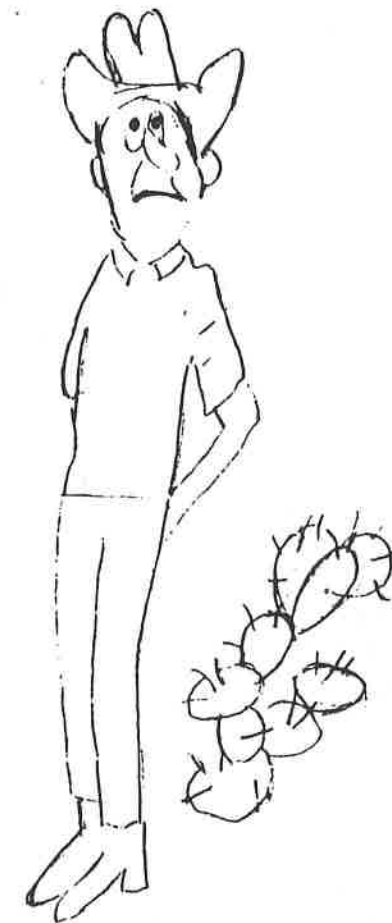
## POINTED IDEAS FOR GIFTS!

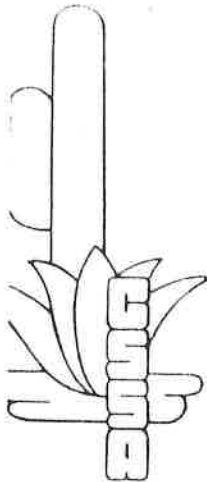

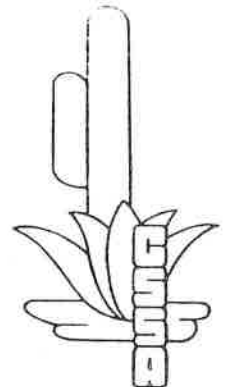

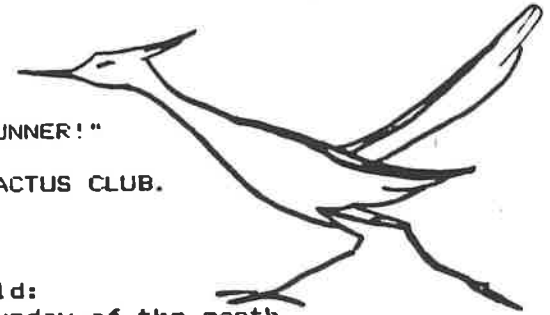
