



FOLLOW-UP -- San Gabriel Valley C&S Soc. STUDY GROUP Report of October meeting

The topic was Aeoniums and other Canary Island succulents. Because the Canary Island xerophytic zone has a dry hot summer during which plants rest and a warm wet winter, these plants like southern California and are beginning to grow at this time. You can propagate them now, and let them receive the winter rains.


Plants include most of the genus Aeonium (family Crassulaceae), Euphorbia lambii, balsamifera, atropurpurea, canariensis, bravoana, Senecio kleinia & anteuphorbium, Ceropegia fusca & dichotoma, Caralluma burchardii, Euphorbia (again) aphylla & regis-jubae, many Monanthes, many Aichryson, Geranium canariense, many Echiums (curious plants -- the Huntington has many E. wildpretii, or 'Tower of Jewels') -- and of course the amazing Dracena draco, or 'Dragon Tree.'

The D. draco will take several years in the ground to start making its stout trunk, and may take 10 or 15 to flower & branch. Impressive is one good adjective for a mature dragon tree.

Among the Aeoniums, A. sedifolium makes a handsome little tree, A. tabuliforme is flat as a pancake & likes to grow vertically in rock crevices. Aeonium nobile is a large heavy succulent-leafed plant which turns reddish orange when it is ready to bloom, & the inflorescence is gorgeous. It will die after blooming, as all Aeonium branches will also do. An unbranched plant, like tabuliforme or nobile will completely croak, alas. If you remove the beginning bloom & of course the apex of the plant IN TIME, then you may get your plant to pup. Remove the pups & plant. Or take leaves (including where they attach to trunk, & propagate). The best known Aeonium of all is A. arboreum 'Zwartkop' -- a sun lover which is a wonderful landscape plant. The soft green leafed Aeoniums of course prefer part shade.

David Bramwell's book on the Canary Island flora is the one to get, if interested. Or talk to study group leader Joe Clements.

It is rather unique that, on transplanting echeverias from their native habitat, they have allowed us to change many of their habits, so decidedly. At home they are said to grow principally in the high lime-stone cliffs of Mexico, although some do grow in other locations. In their adopted home they greatly relish a rich sandy soil and an abundance of water and they will even appreciate an occasional feeding of fertilizer.

E. setosa, meaning hairy one, almost demands leafmold for its well being. Most of the others will thrive in nearly any mixture of soil.




