STAGING WINTER GROWING SUCCULENTS

PROGRAM: KAREN OSTER, will present a program on staging winter growing succulents. She will show slides, present example plants and talk about their care. The selection of plants include Pelargonium, Sarcocaulon, Avonia, Anacampseros, Lithops, Conophytum, Sedum, Sedum, Cheirodopsis, Ornithogallum to name a few. She says, "I never met a plant I didn't like. Is it green? Does it grow? I like that!" As well as cacti and succulents she has raised orchids, African violets, and roses. She has raised from seed lilies and bulbs, a Dracena australis that is now twenty feet tall, Lithops, saguaro, Strelitzia regina (bird of paradise) and an Aloe bainesii that is now ten feet tall though still in a pot. She became active in the C&S scene in the mid eighties when the Inter-City Show began. She is a knowledgeable and joyously enthusiastic speaker.

LOCATION: Dominguez Adobe, 18127 South Alameda Street, Rancho Dominguez, CA 90220. Take the 91 Redondo Beach/ Artesia Freeway and exit south on Alameda. Signs for the Adobe are posted on the freeway and on Alameda. Coming from the freeway, the entrance to the Adobe is on the right or west side of Alameda. We will meet in the cafeteria in the northeast of the big building next to the garden.

2004 PLANT-OF-THE-MONTH RULES

At the April, 2003 meeting, the following rules were adopted for the Plant-of the-Month (POM) competition:

- A maximum of three plants may be entered in each category (cactus and succulent).
- There will be three classes for entrants: advanced (blue tag), intermediate (pink tag) and beginner (yellow tag).
- Advanced and intermediate entrants must have had the plant in their possession for at least six months, beginners for three months.
- Entrants will receive 8 points for first place, 6 points for second place, 4 points for third place, 2 points for show/honorable mention (HM) and 1 point for showing a plant that does not place.
- At the discretion of the judges there may be up to three third places in a category. If plants are not deemed to be of sufficient quality, no third place will be awarded.
- For an entrant to receive points, the entry tags must be collected by the person in charge of record keeping
- At the annual Christmas party, award plants will be presented to the ten highest cumulative point holders regardless of class.

PLANT GROWING CONTEST 2004

Each year at the holiday party members receive a special plant to care for during the coming year. This year's plant is the cactus Discocactus buenekeri provided by Woody Minnich. It is a true miniature from the Bahia region of Brazil where it grows in moss and on rocks. The quarter size plants do not get any bigger but they offset readily and most specimens had at least three or four pups. The small globes can form sizable clusters but the pups have their own roots and can readily be detached and potted. It has pectinate spines very close to the body which makes it a pettable cactus. After several years a three inch tall flower, pure white and extremely fragrant, develops from the wooly white cephalium. At this year's holiday party we will see will see how much everyone's plant has thrived.
