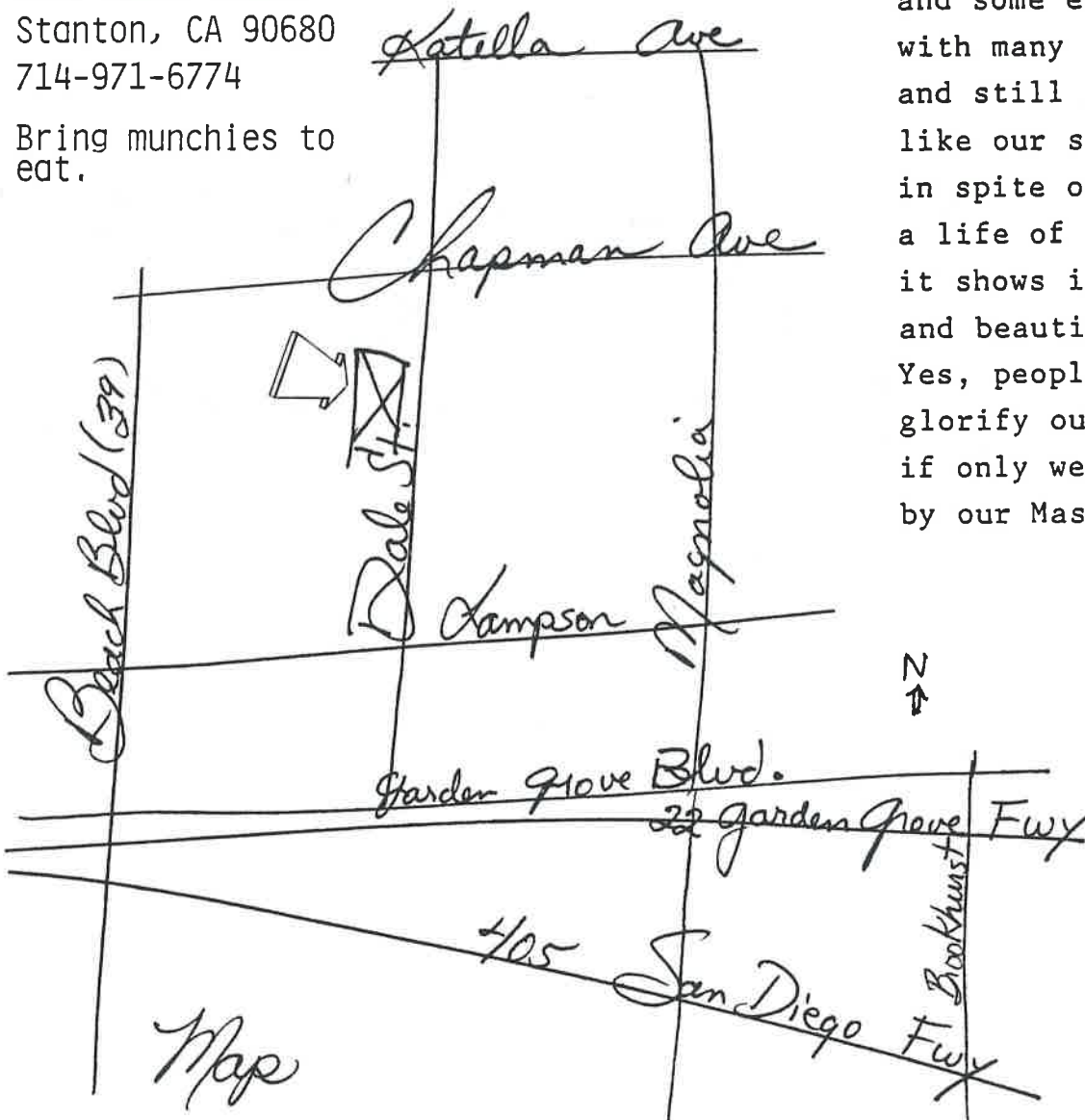

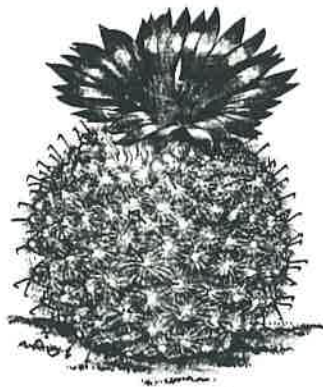


PLANTS OF THE MONTH —

SANSEVIERIA

One of this month's featured plants, Sansevieria has had an advocate in Lillian True for years. She says that when most Sans. are left outside in winter,; it may take an entire growing season for them to recover. They make ideal houseplants, & for years she & Otis brought all her Sans. indoors for the winter, where they lived in, near, & around all the windows, & completely took over the windowed bathroom! Several years ago she gave many of her Sansevierias to the Huntington, where they now live in the Conservatory, Nursery, & a few even outside in a sheltered spot.

**BRAGGING TABLE:** There are plants blooming -- including Copiapoa, Astrophytum, Gymno, Mams, Echeverias & many other succulents. Bring them!

PARODIA

Parodia are among the small South American ball cacti so popular with collectors. They can grow & flower even on a window sill. Their spination alone earns them praise -- with straight or hooked spines they are colorful and attractive. A straight-spined Parodia chrysanthion won best cactus in the National show this year; its intense golden spines against the fresh green body made the plant a showstopper. One day it's possible Parodia will be popularly accepted as a Notocactus! What do you think!? Meanwhile enjoy your Parodias, & give them a slightly richer more acid mix than, say, your "Living Rockers!"

- \* The Inter-City Show is open to anyone wishing to enter. Those wishing to enter, who are not members of one of the host clubs, should contact a show chairman at least one week prior to the week of the show.
  - \* Plant exhibits must have been in the owners possession at least 6 months.
  - \* All plants entered must be free of pests and the show committee may remove any unsuitable material from the show or sale at any time.
  - \* Exhibits should be marked with the owners name not visible to the Judges.
  - \* Exhibitors are responsible for placing entry cards with exhibits prior to judging.
  - \* Awards and exhibits must remain until the end of the show. Sun. 20th at 5:00pm
  - \* All judges decisions and Show committee decisions are final.
  - \* The three host clubs will not assume responsibility for loss or injury of property.
  - \* Only authorized personnel will be permitted in the show area during judging.
  - \* The show committee reserves the right to move plants or displays to improve the show.
  - \* All commercial growers or individuals wishing to sell in the Inter-City Show must enter a display or enter a minimum of 10 plants in the open class. All sellers must contact a Show Sales Chairman as to their needs at least one week prior to show week.
  - \* Inch measurements as indicated in the categories refers to inside dia. of the pot.
  - \* Crests, Monstrose and Variegates may only appear in such categories.
  - \* A Rookie Novice is one who has not shown more than 10 plants cumulative

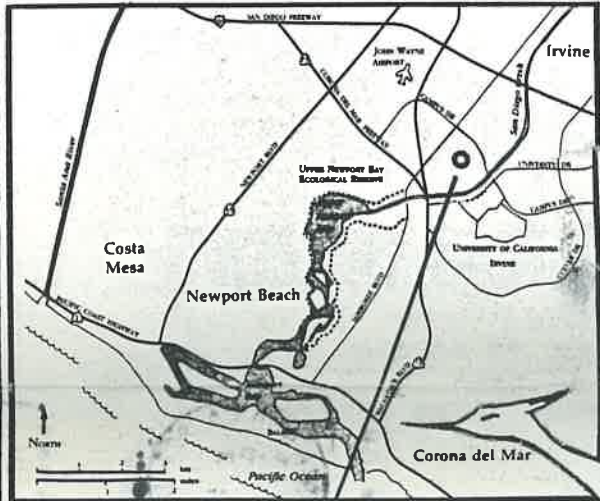

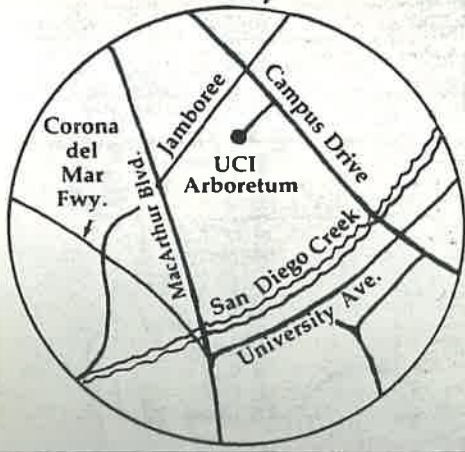
