CACTI OF NORTHERN MEXICO

PROGRAM: VINCE BASTA will present a slide lecture based on two trips he made to northern Mexico with Woody Minnich in fall 1999 and spring 2000. The program will be a travelogue featuring highlights of the regions as well as plants. Cacti featured will include *Ariocarpus*, *Astrophytum*, *Aztekium* and *Turbinicarpus*. Local succulents will also be featured.

Vince is currently president of the San Gabriel Cactus and Succulent Society and was formerly that club's newsletter editor. He has been active in the hobby for about eight years.



2001 PLANT-OF-THM-MONTH RULES

At the November, 1996 meeting, the following rules were adopted for the Plant-of the-Month (POM) competition:

- A maximum of three plants may be entered in each category (cactus and succulent).
- There will be three classes for entrants: advanced (blue tag), intermediate (pink tag) and beginner (yellow tag).
- Advanced and intermediate entrants must have had the plant in their possession for at least six months, beginners for three months.
- Entrants will receive 6 points for first place, 4 points for second place, 2 points for third place and 1 point for showing a plant that does not place.
- At the discretion of the judges there may be up to three third places in a category. If plants are not deemed to be of sufficient quality, no third place will be awarded.
- For an entrant to receive points, the entry tags must be collected by the person in charge of record keeping for POM
- At the annual Christmas party, award plants will be presented to the ten highest cumulative point holders regardless of class.

Alpine Sempervivums

Sempervivums are found, growing among rocks & gravel, in the mountains of Europe & Western Asia. Alpine succulents do not mind cold winters and require minimal care. They do need a little protection from our hot summers.

WATERING: Sempervivums require good drainage and will rot if kept too moist. Allow to dry before watering, then water well. It is best to let Sempervivums stay on the dry side to get through a heat wave (when nights stay warm). Do not water during the heat of the day (when temperatures are in the high 90's or above). Water in the late afternoon so the plants will be well drained before the heat of the following day. Remember Semps are drought tolerant and do not like heat and humidity (good air circulation is helpful).

LIGHT: Sempervivums enjoy full sunlight through the winter and need filtered sunlight in the summer. Avoid dense shade (plants will stretch, lose their form and will not color well). Midday summer sun may burn Semps; filtered sunlight is best in the summer.

PROPAGATION: Sempervivums are easy to propagate from the many chicks that each plant develops; Set the chick on top of moist potting soil (must be fast draining) and watch it grow. Repotting Semps keeps them actively growing. Large old pots slow down and need to be restarted. When a rosette is 2 or 3 years old it may bloom and die leaving many chicks behind to continue the colony. Nothing will stop this process and the blooms are lovely.

FEEDING: Apply a balanced liquid house plant food or fish emulsion (follow manufactures directions at half strength) at the beginning of Spring and again in the Summer.

PESTS: I have selected the most pest resistant Sempervivum varieties for our climate, however I have found it necessary to keep a layer of fine granite on the soil surface to guard against root pests. In the hot summer mealy bugs & aphids can also be a problem. A blast of water may wash them off or a little rubbing alcohol will clean the plant. There are also chemicals available to deal with theses pests, however care must be taken in selecting the proper material. Some chemicals will damage Sempervivums.


